Provided Education and Care for +20,000

Community Action Agencies are one of the Commonwealth’s largest groups of nonprofit early education and care providers for low-income families. They provide education and care for more than 20,000 across the state.



+10,000 Head Start/Early Head Start slots

Community Action Agencies are leaders in providing Head Start services. Head Start is a high-quality model of preschool early education and care which has pioneered many of the “best practices” now being used in other programs. More than 10,150 low-income children and families receive comprehensive services through CAA-sponsored Head Start programs.



More than half of CCR&Rs are operated by CAAs

Community Action Agencies operate half of the State’s Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies (CCR&Rs). These are “one-stop shopping” resources for early education and care services, which offer parent education and quality improvement assistance for providers as well as information and referral to early education and care options. The CCR’s are a critical component of the Early Education and Care infrastructure – they help more than 38,000 children from income eligible working families, DTA families and DCF families. CCR’s also manage the statewide waiting list that has approximately 16,000 children on it.

The CAA Network is focused on quality, affordable childcare and the particularly critical needs of working parents.
